Our first year has been one of great accomplishments and success! With the creation of the organization complete in late March 2018, our official 501c3 acceptance was applied that June. We had already begun working with numerous local historically based groups ranging from Cape May to Ocean County creating a Historic Network. During 2018 we participated in several events throughout New Jersey including The Richland Festival in Buena Vista Twp, the Witches Ball in historic Mt Holly, The Olde Stone House Village 10th Annual Classic Car Show, Harvest Festival, Halloween Adventures, and The Magic of Christmas. For many of the events at the Olde Stone House Village, including The Magic of Christmas, we were able to supply volunteers, donations, supplies, and sponsor buildings for their events. At The Magic of Christmas event, we were able to Sponsor the Blackwood Train Station and (last minute due to another sponsor canceling) the Turnersville Post Office. We set up trains, a tree, live greenery décor, and gave out candy canes while the children had hot chocolate and listened to Volunteer Tony read the Polar Express in a very animated fashion! We even provided a beautiful old fashioned mailbox for the children to mail their letters to Santa.

We were able to secure 2 wooden pews from an old Haddon Heights church which was being decommissioned and turned into a private residence. They were almost perfect in height and size to the benches that would have been in the Olde Stone House Village's Blackwood Train Station. We sent 3 volunteers up to remove the pews and install them for the WTHPC. We also began our Historic Games Interactive Display. We created informational boards with the games names, history, photos, instructions on how to play and information on how to play while volunteers were there to assist with the fun! These are only a few of the highlights!

2018 proved to be only the beginning of great things to come!














IMPORTANT NEWS

STORIES FROM THE LOCALS..... THEN AND NOW

This photo was submitted by Bruce Atkinson of Washington Twp in Gloucester County NJ. The Atkinson family owned a farm at the

intersections of Egg Harbor Rd and County House Rd from 1912 until the late 1970s. In its hayday the farm produced many types of crops, dairy, and eggs. A 1700s stone farm house still stands on the now Olde Stone House Historic Village site, which was just reconized as a NJ Historic Register Site in February and also named to the National Register of Historic Places in April. Originally a 300 acre farm, the site is now 6.5 acres and houses the orginal farm house, smoke house and 4 other historic buildings.



1961 The Barn in the background was the Atkinson Dairy Barn where it sat behind the Stone House on Egg Harbor Rd. I was standing in Dads back yard at age 3 along County House Rd.

The property is now owned by Washington Twp but maintained and run by volunteers of the towns Historic Preservation Commission and funded by donations. This photo was taken behind one



of the other homes on the property which also served as the towns first tax office in a small room of the house. The Atkinson family found the original tax books in the attic and donated them to the Historic Commission.
